Group 1 - MONDAY

- Group 1 words are sight words. These are important as they are the most frequently used words. Most of the words cannot be sounded out.
- Learn the Group 1 sight words using the Look/Say/ Cover/Write/Check strategy (p. vii).
- Encourage students to use Group 1 words in oral sentences, e.g. I went to school.

Activity 1 - Tuesnay

Revise Group 1 words using Look/Say/Cover/Write/Check.

Activity 1: students need to choose a Group 1 word to complete the sentences.

Answers:

- 1. I put on my shoes.
- We live in a village.
- I like going to school.
- 4. He used the axe to chop wood.
- 5. Snails have a shell on their back.
- 6. Ants and bees are insects and they have six legs.

Word Study - MONDAY/TUESDAY

Homophones: I – eye, to – two – too, we – wee. Homophones sound the same but are spelt differently and have different meanings, e.g.

I can see with my eye. We walked to school.
I have two eyes. He ate too much food.

We are going to the shops. A mouse is a wee animal.

Proper nouns: I is a proper noun (naming word) and needs a capital letter. A proper noun is the special name given to something.

Group 2 - WEDNESOW

- Learn the Group 2 words. The words in Group 2 have the /a/ sound, as in ont, trop. Use the sounding out strategy to learn these words.
- To sound out a word, listen to the sound in the word.
 Break the words into parts, e.g. mat = m + a + t or mat = m + at. A part may be more than one letter, e.g. trap = tr + op.
- Have students say the words aloud, concentrating on the correct pronunciation.
- Encourage students to use Group 2 words in oral sentences, e.g. We sat on the mat.

Activity 2 - THURSDAY

Bevise Group 2 words using Look/Say/Cover/Write/Check.

Activity 2: students need to match the word parts to make Group 2 words, e.g. $\rho + \alpha t = \rho \alpha t$.

Answers: fan, pat, grab, trap, lamp, sand.

Word Study - WEDNESDAY/THURSDAY

Beginning sounds: listen to the two sounds before the vowel (a), e.g. gr = (grab), ci = (clap), tr = (trap).

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Ending sounds: listen to the ending sounds (blends) after the vowel (a, e.g. -mp (Samp), -nd (sand).

Rhyme: these words have the same endings and rhyme: mot - pot, clop - trop.

More words with the /a/ sound, as in trap: ant, axe, bad, had, mad, bag, can, pan, man, ran, bat, cat, hat, sat, has, bank, flag, flat, apple, stand.

Spelling and dictation test - FRIDAY

Ten words are tested at the end of each week. The test consists of three given Group 1 words and three given Group 2 words, plus four words to be selected by the teacher – it is suggested that two of these be taken from Group 1 and two from Group 2.

Test by dictating the ten words. For extra dictation, create your own sentence using words from Groups 1 and 2 or select a sentence from Activity 1.

Note! Make sure that students do not confuse English spelling and Tok Pisin (shown in Italics): e.g. fan – fen, lamp – lom, sand – weson.
